## OUR ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

On September 19, 2015, we held our Annual General meeting at the Hockley Village Community Hall, and were pleased to host about 50 members. The meeting featured a combination of the normal legal procedures that are required for incorporated organizations, (Board Election, Treasurer's Report and others) and a full update of our activities over the past year and for the future. Our very thorough Secretary, Rita Reitsma, did a fine job on the meeting Minutes, which you can find on our website. This will provide all our members, in some detail, with what was covered at the meeting.

I would like to highlight a couple of key issues that we discussed. We elected our Board, a group of talented and energetic individuals who keep the organization moving ahead. We

reviewed the important role played by our volunteers. Starting with our Board and our Committees, our work fully depends on the support of our members. Our very active Environment Committee has been doing a fine job of raising issues that are of critical importance. On another front, our work on objecting to the dramatic influx of potentially contaminated landfill into our rural communities has been driven by highly committed volunteers, members of the Board and from our members at large.

We are currently assessing how many issues we can deal with in a meaningful and professional way. As you will see from our Minutes, we are doing a lot at present. We have a Board sub-committee looking at what else we should be doing, and what we can practically deal with.

This review is discussed elsewhere in this Newsletter.

In the end, MC<sup>2</sup> is thriving because of all our members. Our membership of 300 to 400 citizens helps us in many ways, starting with paying their \$30 per year per family membership fees, making donations (well over \$1000 in 2015), and in many cases volunteering. The AGM is the one opportunity, each year, to gather a significant group of our members, to talk about our activities, and then to share some social time together. For the Board, this event is a re-energizing opportunity to connect with the people who support our work and provide us with very helpful input on what we are doing. ## FROM DON'S DESK....


As another year draws to an end it is time to take another look at what is happening in our community. While an organization like MC<sup>2</sup> tends, appropriately, to look at the many challenges we face, we need to remember the many positive aspects of life here in Mono and Mulmur, the things that have drawn people here for the past nearly two hundred years. At times, because we see so many threats to our community, we don't emphasize enough the good things.

And, while it all starts with the beauty of our area, there is much more. For me it starts with the community itself, the ever-dynamic mix of newer arrivals with the people who have lived here for many generations. We came here drawn by the beauty, but we stay because of our friends and neighbours. The cultural richness of a community filled with artists and their organizations, by the rich plethora of wonderful gardens, themselves works of art. The many galleries selling fine art work and handicrafts. The live films of operas and plays showing at the Galaxy. The Dufferin Arts Council lunches. The many book clubs. Lots of fine restaurants. The fairs and festivals. The wide range of available services. And much more. To top it all off, the huge urban area to our south, in some ways the bane of existence here, adds a whole other layers of cultural and economic diversity.

I need at times to run down this list (and I realize I have missed many of the elements that appeal to us all) because I spend a lot of time (maybe too much) thinking and worrying about the challenges we face. It's good to remember what we are working to protect, but at the

same time to maintain a positive perspective.

Over the past year, MC<sup>2</sup> has been working on a wide range of issues, on

which we have been reporting at regular intervals.

The threat of a major influx of landfill from the city has been a major concern. We are working closely with the Town of Mono and the citizens group led by Elaine Kehoe to present the wide range of concerns to the Normal Farm Practices Protection Board. We have recently joined the Ontario Soil Restoration Task Force, a Province-wide body that is working at a high level on this issue.

The environmental risks to our community from the wide range of chemicals and genetically modified materials used in agriculture, as well as the threat of natural disasters, are being addressed by our Environment Committee.

We are addressing the need for increased transparency by our local Councils.

We have continued our support for groups working on a range of issues which threaten our community, including Protect Mono and CORE on the issue of the uncontrolled expansion of aggregate mining,

NDACT/Food and Water First, and the Community Safety and Business Protection Board (CSBPB) working on the road safety and liability risks. We are now meeting with these groups to evaluate where we can combine activities and expand mutual support, while not interfering with any group's independence.

We continue to present information to the community through our Town Hall meetings, most

recently in the form of All Candidates meetings for local elections.

We have started to work with our Councils to address the problem of motorcycle noise on our roads, an issue which will require a stronger effort.

Along with these priorities, we do the day to day work of running our organization. Our website is up and running, and is getting to the point where it is meeting our members' needs. We put out 3-4 Newsletters a year. The Board meets monthly and committees are active, and we write regular letters to politicians and the local press.

Having said all of this, we debate regularly whether we are doing enough, and whether we could be doing more to play a part in protecting all the good aspects of life in our community. We are doing a great deal, but are we missing important issues? And on the issues we address, are we doing so in the most effective way? We have set up a sub-committee of our Board to look into these issues. The question of

which is our home, has been an effective and strong organization over the years. To maintain this positive role, we continually need to question and challenge ourselves. As we do this evaluation, we will need the input of our members.

- We continued to be active on the **Fill Dumping issue**. On **July 20<sup>th</sup>**, Board Directors Don MacFarlane and Ernie Rovet attended the Pre-Hearing of the Normal Farm Practices Protection Board and gained recognition of MC<sup>2</sup> as a Party to the hearing. We also attended a meeting of the parties opposed to the Cox application, where we attempted to coordinate and align strategies and witnesses.
- MC<sup>2</sup> also continued to address the **Road Noise issue**, particularly in Mulmur, where we addressed Council on ideas to deal with this problem. Little progress has been made to reduce motorcycle noise, and this problem will need to be readdressed more aggressively over the next few months. The key problem appears to be that we can't find ways to
- engage the OPP in policing speeding and related noise on our paved roads. With the number of serious accidents we see on roads, such as River Road in Mulmur, this needs to be driven as a stronger priority for the Councils and police. We will inform members as we work to find solutions to this problem and we would be happy to receive any suggestions and help in dealing with road noise.
- Board director Bob Mitchell (acting as a private citizen) brought David Suzuki's **Blue Dot Campaign** to the attention of Mono Council recently. The campaign is "looking to put more pressure on federal and municipal governments to increase their environmental responsibility by asking local municipalities to sign a declaration noting the environmental rights of their citizens" (Orangeville Citizen October 15). These rights include breathing fresh air, drinking clean water and eating healthy food according to Dr. Suzuki. Mono Council had a few concerns about liability issues, if they were to join the campaign. They agreed to create a sub-committee to evaluate the campaign and subsequent responsibilities that would come from joining and make recommendations to Council.
